Tips for Fall Gardening

- Divide and re-plant spring blooming perennials such as Iris, yarrow, daisies, daffodils and daylilies (late September to early October).
- Plant chrysanthemums, asters, petunias, marigolds and other fall color plants.
- Plant beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, cilantro, collards, bush English and snap peas, leaf lettuce, bush lima beans, onion seeds, parsley, radishes, spinach, and turnips for fall harvest. If you don't plant a fall vegetable garden, sow Elbon rye as a winter cover crop.
- Avoid pruning spring-flowering trees and shrubs during the fall, as pruning now will reduce spring flowers.
- Continue to cut back spent flowers of annuals and perennials to encourage fall blooming until first frost.
- Apply a pre-emergent herbicide for cool season grassy weed control. It is also time to apply a pre-emergent for broadleaf winter weeds. Apply both by the end of September (but do not try to mix products), then water normally. Do not use a pre-emergent if you plan to overseed your lawn. Watch for brown patch in St. Augustine lawns and control with labeled fungicide.
- Watch for fall webworms on pecans, mulberries, and other susceptible trees and trim out webs as necessary or treat with appropriate products.
- Plant daffodils from late October to mid November.
- Plant pansies, flowering kale and cabbage, dianthus, cyclamen, violas for fall color as the weather cools at the end of October.
- Divide and re-plant ground covers like lirioppe and mondo grass, as well as new ground covers.
- Select and plant shrubs and trees, especially those that are grown for fall foliage, while fall color is visible. Late October is an excellent time for planting shrubs and hardy perennials, although it's best to wait until the winter dormant season for planting shade trees, or transplanting large woody shrubs or ornamental trees such as crape myrtles.
- Mulch or gather leaves regularly as they drop. A thick leaf layer on lawns can promote insects and diseases and delay winter dormancy. Add excess leaves to the compost pile or shred leaves and use as mulch in beds.

VIP Updates

Just an FYI, 17 VIP's patrolled our streets and alley ways for 142.25 hours during August. Although this was an increase over July, there was a bump up in reported incidents by DPD. In August, we had three vehicle break-ins/vandalism and the fire at Forestridge Elementary compared to only 2 in July. Our monthly avg. is 3.87 for reported incidents.

Below is a listing showing all crimes that have been reported by DPD on their web page for our Reporting Area and the three surrounding R.A.'s so far this year. We look good in comparison.

We want to stress again for everyone to remove valuables from their vehicles and that all vehicles need to be locked if not in the garage.

A VIP patroller reported 4 youths on bikes coming out of alleys recently around 5:30 p.m. He said he followed them all the way down to the Richland Trace Apartments.

If kids are cruising in groups on bikes at times other than school time, or they are not on main streets going to and from the park, for example, then we need to consider them as suspicious.

From Neighborhood Patrol Officer Chad Brisco: Police are in the neighborhood one to four times a day, checking on Friendship Park. Owner of abandoned house on Rita Rd is being tracked. No suspicious or drug activity reported in the neighborhood in the past month. Regal Springs Apartment Complex is not on the SAFE program. Detective Burke Ruppy will be contacted as into why.

Safety/VIP Holt Mitchell/Mike Gorman

Six new volunteers for the VIP program. Next training class will take place on Aug. 31 and Sept 1. Mike asks that neighbors please watch for bikers with backpacks outside of normal school hours.

Richardson painted a left turn lane at the intersection of Whispering Hills and Buckingham. Richardson also retimed the signal, so that the wait time at the light should be not longer than 15 seconds.

Does Your Sidewalk Look Like This?

City ordinance requires property owners to replace sidewalks, drive approaches or any other associated element when they become defective, unsafe or hazardous.



The Dallas Public Works Department offers help with two sidewalk replacement programs:

Cost Share

- This is the traditional program from which the City partners with citizens to share the cost 50/50 for existing residential sidewalk removal and replacement. This is funded by bond programs while available.

- In addition, the property owner will pay 100% for the cost of drive approach removal and replacement. The City pays for all other miscellaneous items including barrier free ramps.

- In the Cost Share Program, sidewalk removal and replacement are logged in by the date received.

- From the initial inquiry it takes two to three months to assess the property and provide an estimate. From the time of payment it is approximately two to six months until project completion

Fast Fix Program

- Fast Fix is a residential and commercial (except the downtown area) sidewalk program which allows citizens to obtain sidewalk removal and replacement without having to experience an extended wait.

- City staff inspects the property and provide an estimate. The program also includes the option of removal and replacement of curb and gutter, drive approaches and lead walks. The property owner then pays the contractor 100% of the total cost through an existing price agreement with the City. The work is completed in thirty to sixty days.

- Key advantage of the Fast Fix program includes the purchasing power of the City.

Both programs have a one year warranty on workmanship. The City secures all necessary permits.

Property owners may experience delays in sod replacement (if required) due to seasonal availability.

Yard Sale Guidelines

From Dallas Code Department website
dallascityhall.com/departments/codecompliance/garagesale

- The permit fee is \$0 for the 1st garage sale permit and \$25 for the 2nd garage sale permit in a 12-month period.
- There is a limit of two (2) garage sales at a premise during any twelve (12) month period and each sale may not exceed more than three (3) consecutive calendar days in length.
- One sign is allowed upon the lot where the sale is taking place. Up to five signs are allowed at remote locations advertising the sale.
- Signs must be placed on private property (with permission of the property owner).
- Signs placed on medians, public property or utility poles are illegal.
- Signs must be removed within 24 hours following the sale..

The 5 Ws Needed When Calling 911

Where - It is important to know the exact location of the emergency.

What – Briefly tell the 9-1-1 operator what you are reporting.

When - Tell the 9-1-1 operator when the incident occurred or if it is in progress.

Who - Tell the 9-1-1 operator how many suspects are involved. Describe clothing, vehicle, and the direction of travel if the suspect left the location.

Weapons – Tell the 9-1-1 operator if the suspect, you, or anyone at the location has a weapon. Follow the operator's instructions if you are asked to put the weapon away before responders arrive.

Try to remain calm when calling 9-1-1.

Listen to the operator and answer all the questions with brief responses. The operator will only ask questions he or she needs to process the call while keeping the safety of the caller and responders in mind.

Always keep your safety in mind when you call 9-1-1. You may need to leave the location or lock yourself in a room.

If you are unable to talk to the operator when your safety is compromised, you may need to lay the phone down and leave an open line so the operator can listen to what is going on inside the location.

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Curb (Bulky) Trash Pick-up Dates

Pick-up Weeks Begin:

September 28 and October 26

Our pick-up week is the 4th (not always last) Monday of the month. **Place trash on the curb beginning at 7 am the previous Thursday until 7 am on Monday.** To avoid missing pick-up, put trash out by Sunday evening. Trucks are often in the area early on Monday.

Dallas Code Enforcement is not required to give warning before issuing a possible \$250-\$2000 fine for trash on the curb before or after the above window of days. Call 311 to arrange for Cost Plus pick-ups at times outside of the pick-up week.

Only place out large limbs, shrubbery, bagged leaves (in sealed 50 gallon or smaller bags), furniture, appliances, mattresses and box springs. Separate yard waste from other trash.

Do not place grass clippings, bricks, concrete, rocks, dirt or construction/remodeling materials on the curb for pick-up during collection. Call Cost Plus for those materials.

Regular Trash/Recycling (Tuesdays)

Place the blue recycling container along with your gray trash container in the alley on Tuesdays by 7:00 a.m..

To order a Big Blue recycling cart, call 311 or go to dallascityhall.com. The cart will be delivered to your home.

Hazardous Materials Disposal

If you have household waste such as paint, pesticides and yard chemicals, pool chemicals, motor oil and other automotive fluids, cleaners, glues and other hobby products, fluorescent lights, batteries, old computers, or cell phones, **do not throw them in the trash or your regular recycle container.** Instead take them to the Home Chemical Collection Center at 11234 Plano Road. It is located on the east (left, going south) side of Plano Road, south of Forest Lane, just before the DART tracks. **Bring a driver's license or a water or utility bill to show proof of residence in Dallas County.** The workers there will unload your items and dispose of them safely.
